Discipline / Subject:

Language Arts, Math

Topic:

Reading Informational Text and Symmetry

Grade Level:

4th grade

Resources / References / Materials Teacher Needs:

Day of the Dead Activity Book by Karl Jones or other books about the holiday

Art supplies; tissue paper, markers, white paper, black butcher paper, glue, scissors, etc.

Lesson Summary:

Students will learn about Dia de Los Muertos, or the Day of the Dead, and create a dancing sugar skull husky dog skeleton. The rib cage of the husky dog will be created by the student's name on a symmetrical fold

Learning Objectives:

- Students will learn about the Day of the Dead holiday
- Students will create a husky dog sugar skull skeleton using templates and their symmetrical name as the rib cage
- Students will decorate the husky dog's head like a traditional sugar skull

Assessment:

1. The student's name should be symmetrical by folding the paper in half forming a line of congruence on the fold

Procedural Activities

- 1. Research the Day of the Dead using various books such as <u>Day of the Dead Activity</u> Book by Karl Jones.
- 2. Research what sugar skulls look like from books or online.
- 3. Use tissue paper and art supplies to decorate the husky dog sugar skulls. Remember that the white part resembles the "sugar".
- 4. In math review symmetry
- 5. Take a sheet of paper, preferably larger than 8 ½ X 11 and fold it in half the long way.
- 6. Using a pencil, students should write their names in large block letters.
- 7. Go over it in black marker as an option.
- 8. Using scissors cut out the name, still holding it in half, making a symmetrical name when opened.
- 9. Color and decorate the ears
- 10. Cut out the other template pieces and keep them white for bones. The symmetrical name is the rib cage.
- 11. Lay out the pieces on black butcher paper and glue them down.
- 12. It is fine if the dog sugar skeleton looks like it is dancing!
- 13. Cut out the dogs with a little border and put on display.

Materials Students Need:

Day of the Dead Activity Book by Karl Jones

Art supplies; tissue paper, markers, white paper, black butcher paper, glue, scissors, etc.

Technology Utilized to Enhance Learning:

Computer or tablet

Optional: view web sites and images online of the Day of the Dead and sugar skull creations for inspiration

Other Information:

Using the site: www.photosforclass.com provides students will copyright free images of the Iditarod, Day of the Dead sugar skulls, or any other topic for research

Modifications for Special Learners/ Enrichment Opportunities:

Modified:

Draw out the student's name symmetrically with them, and then let them cut it out

Enrichment:

Have students teach other students about the Day of the Dead

Create a class altar by following the book, and put the Spanish translations of the terms on the altar

Have tours of the altar for other classes

Create a Day of the Dead art gallery by displaying your husky dogs on the walls of your school or classroom
