#### Topic:

Narrative writing

#### **Grade Level:**

2nd grade - middle school

#### **Resources / References / Materials Teacher Needs:**

- 1. Turkey image- PDF
- 2. Art supplies, markers, faux fur pieces, construction paper, etc.
- 3. Turkey on the Trail information sheet

#### **Lesson Summary:**

Students will disguise a paper turkey as a husky training for the Iditarod race. They will write a 1<sup>st</sup> person narrative pretending to be the turkey. They will describe how they will escape the farm and not become Thanksgiving dinner because of their husky dog disguise.

#### **Learning Objectives:**

- 1. Students will write a 1<sup>st</sup> person narrative pretending to be a turkey that disguises itself as an Iditarod husky to escape being Thanksgiving dinner.
- Students will use writing techniques such as dialogue, elaboration, figurative language, and transitional words to narrate the turkey's escape from the farm.

#### **Assessment:**

- 1. Turkey on the Trail in Disguise information sheet
- 2. Narrative 1<sup>st</sup> person and one to two pages describing the plan of escape
- 3. Writing rubric will be created by the teacher:

#### **Procedural Activities**

- If you are an Iditarod Insider Subscriber, show your students videos of mushers in training and discuss what a husky dog needs to do and learn to be part of an Iditarod team.
- Explain to students that they will be disguising a paper turkey as an Iditarod husky in training for the Iditarod. Brainstorm what husky dogs in training need: dog booties, harnesses, etc.
- 3. Hand out the paper turkey graphics to students, and let them decorate their turkeys with fabric, faux fur, and art supplies.
- 4. Give students the information sheet with the expectations and directions for the project. This activity can be created at home or at school.
- 5. On the due date, bring in the disguised turkeys and create an Iditarod Trail bulletin board for display.

#### **Materials Students Need:**

- 1. Turkey image- PDF
- 2. Art supplies, markers, faux fur pieces, construction paper, etc.
- 3. Turkey on the Trail information sheet
- 4. Turkey writing can be handwritten or typed

#### **Technology Utilized to Enhance Learning:**

Teachers with Insider Subscriptions can view musher videos showcasing the training of the dog teams in November.

Optional: The Chatterpix Kids app records the students reading their narratives while the turkey's mouth moves. They can be shared digitally with parents or embedded on a teacher website.

#### Other Information:

Other forms and genres of writing can be used for this writing piece instead of a narrative. Students can write a persuasive piece or even a poem to explain their disguise and plan of escape for their turkey.

#### **Enrichment:**

Have students research husky dogs from either the Iditarod Insider videos or from internet sources. Write their narrative piece using information and facts about husky dogs, such as adding dog booties to the turkey, mushing terms such as "gee" and "haw", and adding factual information about training a real husky dog for the Iditarod to make the writing more informative and factual.
