Lesson Summary

In this lesson students will create an Iditarod magazine with four articles in it: descriptive, compare/contrast, persuasive, and problem/solution. Students will also include pictures, a glossary, and an activity for the reader to complete.

Learning Objectives:	Assessment:
1.) Students will compose 4 writing pieces.	Students will create an Iditarod themed magazine.
2.) Students will use proper grammar and punctuation in their writing.	

Procedural Activities:

1.) Begin by reviewing the Iditarod race: who won, who was the red lantern, who won the different awards, who didn't make it to the finish line, what was the weather like, etc.

2.) Explain to students that they are going to create an Iditarod themed magazine with 4 different writing pieces. Give examples of each kind of writing.

3.) Allow students to take time to write each piece (we took a day per writing piece). They should also peer edit their writing.

4.) Once all the writing is done allow students to add the additional requirements to their magazines.

5.) Once all magazines are done students can share them with one another.
