Topic: Opinion Writing

Grade Level: 3-6, others with modification

Lesson Summary:

Students will explore a text set to help develop an opinion on the question, "Could a rookie musher win the Iditarod?" They will then draft an opinionwriting piece that supports their opinion.

Learning Objectives:

TLW analyze a text set to develop and help support an opinion on a given topic.

TLW draft a piece of writing which clearly states and supports their opinion on a topic

Assessment:

Students will be assessed on their final piece of writing.

Procedural Activities

- 1. Use a tool like Kahoot to create a survey. Ask the students if they feel a rookie could win the Iditarod Sled Dog Race. Or, go low tech and just do a show of hands. Record their responses to revisit later.
- 2. Lead a discussion about the reasons why the students had the opinion that had.
- 3. Share the book <u>Stubborn Gal</u>: The <u>True Story of an Undefeated Sled Dog Racer</u> with the students. This is the true story of a woman who won a race in her rookie year.
- 4. After reading the book, ask the students if they think a rookie EVER won the Iditarod? Of course they did what about the first year? Share with the students the selected pages from the Media Guide. In examining these sources, the students should be able to identify that a rookie did win the race a few times in the early years and that the coveted prize for rookies at this point is the Rookie of the Year Award.
- 5. Introduce the concept of the Rookie of the Year award as a way to recognize the achievements of the top rookie each year. If time allows, you may want to share the story of Nathan Schroeder's Rookie of the Year win in 2014: https://itcteacheronthetrail.com/2014/03/12/catching-up-with-nathan/
- 6. Provide the students with the remaining articles from the text set. These articles introduce the idea that Dallas Seavey won the Yukon Quest in his rookie run in 2011.
- 7. Distribute the OREO organizer to the students and review the directions. The students will use the organizer to gather their thoughts about the big question: Could a rookie musher win the contemporary Iditarod race?
- 8. Once the organizer is complete, students will draft an opinion piece of writing supporting their belief.
- 9. When everyone has completed the assignment, revisit the survey to see how many opinions changed based on the gathered information.
