Lesson Plan Title: Life Lessons from Dogs

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Discipline / Subject: Language Arts

Topic: Reading or listening comprehension, vocabulary, writing, character education

Grade Level: 2nd – 8th

Resources / References / Materials Teacher Needs: Copies of *Alaska's Dog Heroes* by Shelley Gill Alaska's Dog Heroes

Lesson Summary: Students will listen to and/or read *Alaska's Dog Heroes* by Shelley Gill. They will then have a list of life lessons and match one or more life lessons to the story of the dog hero or think of life lessons learned from their own dog.

Procedural Activities

1. Read aloud one of the Alaska's Dog Heroes stories during read aloud time.

2. Students have a list of life lessons.

3. Discuss from the story which life lessons were taught by that dog. This is a good avenue for discussing new vocabulary.

4. This can be a daily activity for Morning Meeting or language arts/read aloud time. It can also be a writing prompt.

5. For older students, this could be a group activity where students read one story daily and come up with a summary and life lessons list by searching "Life Lessons" for lists online.

Materials Students Need:

List of life lessons

Notebook or composition book in which to write

Technology Utilized to Enhance Learning:

• Students create a Google Slides presentation with one life lesson per slide, adding in images of dogs or Iditarod teams

Other Information: With older students researching life lesson lists online, there would be opportunities for debate on which life lessons are worthy to adopt.

Modifications for special learners/ Enrichment Opportunities: As an enrichment opportunity, ask students to do the same with a book or article they have recently read; "What life lessons did you glean from the characters or events in the book?"

A modification for special learners might be to act out one of the stories and then roleplay a similar situation that could happen in school. For example, "How can lead others to safe places?"
