Lesson Plan Title: Embarrassing Moments

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Discipline / Subject: Reading, Writing, Social/Emotional Development

Topic: Writing; empathy; self-analysis

Grade Level: 6th – 10th

Resources / **References** / **Materials Teacher Needs:** *Iditarod, The First Ten Years* book

Lesson Summary: Students read an article about an embarrassing Iditarod moment and then make connections with a possible moment of their own

Assessment:

Student paragraph and presentation

Procedural Activities

- 1. At a center during reading, have the *Iditarod, The First Ten Years* book, or type up the stories and place in Google Classroom
- 2. Post assignment
- 3. Students read page 369, "An Embarrassing Iditarod Moment" by Slim Randles

- 4. Discuss with a partner the fact that Colonel Norman Vaughan was a very famous explorer in Antarctica. Why was Mr. Randles so embarrassed?
- 5. After discussing this, the students will be asked to write about a famous person they know of with whom they would be embarrassed if the person asked them to describe something, then found out they were famous and already knew about it.
- 6. Older students can locate a YouTube video of the famous person and insert the link into the page at the end. Let classmates guess which famous person would cause you to be embarrassed in such a situation by sharing written work. If they cannot guess, start the video.

Materials Students Need: computer to type; Internet access for YouTube videos

Technology Utilized to Enhance Learning:

Computers, YouTube

Other information: All grade levels require personal narrative writing, so this assignment can be adapted for most levels, though older students will understand the irony of Mr. Randles' story.

Modifications for special learners/ Enrichment Opportunities

Teachers could write a more specific prompt with a certain famous person involved
