THE WILDBIRCH HOTEL NAMED OFFICIAL ANCHORAGE HEADQUARTERS OF THE 2026 IDITAROD TRAIL SLED DOG RACE®

Locally owned lifestyle hotel located in the heart of the Mushing District announces formal sponsorship

ANCHORAGE, Alaska – Dec. 8, 2025 – The newly opened <u>Wildbirch Hotel</u>, Anchorage's first lifestyle boutique property, announces its official sponsorship of the 2026 <u>Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race®</u>, an annual long-distance sled dog race stretching from Anchorage to Nome for an approximate 1,000-mile journey through Alaska. The race is produced by the Iditarod Trail Committee, a 501(C)(3) nonprofit organization whose mission is to preserve the rich tradition of the Alaska sled dog and the Iditarod Trail.

The Wildbirch Hotel – a JdV by Hyatt property – anchors the burgeoning West Fourth Avenue Corridor, known as Anchorage's Mushing District. The property overlooks the Iditarod's ceremonial starting line and will serve as commencement headquarters. Programming, including race-themed food and beverage specials at the hotel's signature restaurant, Crimson; overnight accommodations with a view of the starting line; as well as musher meet-and-greets will be announced.

"We are honored to announce this formal partnership with the Iditarod® and our sponsorship of the 2026 race," said Patrick Faas, general manager of The Wildbirch Hotel. "This is an iconic event steeped in rich Alaska history; it's part of the very fabric of our neighborhood, and we are pleased to support the effort in keeping this special occasion true to its traditions."

The Ceremonial Start of the 54th Iditarod Trail Sled Dog Race® will take place on Saturday, March 7, 2026, in downtown Anchorage. The event kicks off with a tribute to multiple branches of the U.S. Military, followed by a performance from the Kingikmiut Singers and Dancers, who share traditional Inupiat songs and dances from Wales, Alaska. Mushers will depart down 4th Avenue and D Street in three-minute intervals beginning at 10:30 a.m.

The official restart occurs the next day at Willow Lake, about 50 miles north of Anchorage, marking the true beginning of the 1,000-mile race to Nome. Unlike the ceremonial run, the Willow restart is timed and competitive, with mushers navigating Alaska's extreme terrain, from mountains to frozen rivers, as every second counts toward the standings that will shape the journey to the finish line.

The Wildbirch Hotel brings a modern, authentic, and distinctly Alaskan feel" said Rob Urbach, CEO of the Iditarod. "Their vision to elevate Anchorage's visitor experience aligns seamlessly with the Iditarod's legacy and future goals. This partnership supercharges the Iditarod experience for Alaska and the world."
